Ramsay School is preparing for the *Montana Aligned to Standards Through-Year (MAST) assessment* through the Montana Office of Public Instruction. Students in Grades 3-8 will take Math and English Language Arts (ELA) assessments in 4 administration windows as indicated in below chart:

What is the purpose of the MAST assessment?

The Montana OPI in partnership with New Meridian has developed an improved assessment system that will accurately reflect the needs of our students, teachers, and administrators while providing useful flexibility in terms of test administration. The MAST Assessment implements "through year" assessments across the state that satisfy federal testing requirements and better aligns assessment with instruction.

The ultimate goal with the "through year" model is to support the formative instructional process that is closer to the local decisions required to support teaching and learning needs. Rather than a single end-of-year assessment, the MAST assessment is broken up into smaller testlets over the course of the academic year. The "Through-Year Assessment" design benefits students, teachers, parents, and administrators by more closely aligning assessment with instruction while providing actionable data throughout the school year.

It is important to remember that statewide assessments provide only one measure of student learning, but when combined with grades, classroom activities, unit quizzes and tests, and district-level assessments, statewide assessments can complete the picture of a child's abilities and help him/her down a path toward academic success in reaching Montana's Content Standards.

Details about the 2024-2025 administration:

- Participants: 3-8 Grades Math and ELA
- Administrations: 4 administration windows throughout the year
- Total Estimated Testing Time: 15-30 minutes per testlet

- Technology: Computer-based test delivery via secure site
- Reports: Student reports will be available for teachers and districts after administration. Individual student reports will provide results from each testlet and will be made available to parents/guardians upon request.

Here are some things to note about the MAST test:

- Your child's privacy will be protected. State and federal laws, such as the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), ensure these data remain confidential.
- Students with Individual Educational Plans (IEPs), Section 504 plans, or English Learner plans will be assessed based on individual student needs, consistent with all state and federal laws and regulations.

Here are some things you can do to help:

- Encourage your child to do their very best on everything they do in school, including the MAST assessment.
- Make sure he or she gets plenty of sleep the night before each test and has a healthy breakfast.
- Support your child by explaining the purpose of the tests and helping with homework and test reviews.

PART I. GENERAL EXPECTATIONS

The Ramsay School agrees to implement the following requirements as outlined by ESEA Section 1116:

 - iii. Disseminating information on best practices focused on PFE, especially best practices for increasing the engagement of economically disadvantaged parents and family members.
 - iv. Collaborating, or providing subgrants to schools to enable schools to collaborate with community-based organizations or employers with a record of success in improving and increasing PFE.
 - v. Engaging in any other activities and strategies that the LEA determines are appropriate and consistent with such agency's PFE policy.

The Ramsay School will:

- 6. On the request of parents, provide opportunities for regular meetings for parents to formulate suggestions, and to participate, as appropriate, in decisions about the education of their children. The school will respond to any such suggestions as soon as practicably possible.
- 7. Provide to each parent an individual student report about the performance of their child on the State assessment (PARCC) in at least math, language arts and reading.

1. The Ramsay School will take the following actions to involve parents and family members in jointly developing its LEA plan under Section 1112, and the development of support and improvement plans under paragraphs (1) and (2) of Section 1111(d) of the ESEA, as applicable.

- Questionnaires regarding student services. Assist teachers in establishing personalized starting points and goal setting for each student.

The Ramsay School will provide the coordination, technical assistance, and other support necessary to assist and build the capacity of all participating schools within the local educational agency in planning and implementing effective parent and family engagement activities to improve student academic achievement and school performance, which may include meaningful consultation with employers, business leaders, and philanthropic organizations, or individuals with expertise in effectively engaging parents and family members in education

- 4. The Ramsay School will conduct, with the meaningful involvement of parent and family members, an annual evaluation of the content and effectiveness of the parent and family engagement policy in improving the academic quality of all schools served under this part, including identifying:

- 5. The Ramsay School will use the findings of such evaluation to design evidence-based strategies for more effective parental involvement and to revise, if necessary, the parent and family engagement policies.
 - Hold semi-annual meetings
 - Allow parents/families to review PFE policies and make recommendations
- 6. The Ramsay School will involve parents in the activities of the schools served under Title I, which may include establishing a parent advisory board.  - School Website
 - Monthly phone/text/email Title 1 shout-outs
 - C. The LEA will, to the extent feasible and appropriate, coordinate and integrate parent involvement programs and activities with the following Federal, District, and LEA programs, including public pre-school programs, and conduct other activities, such as parent resource centers, that encourage and support parents in more fully participating in the education of their children:
 - Field trips which include family members

 - Provide family directories
 - Meet and Greet at the beginning of the year
 - Parent/family invited to all school assemblies
 - D. The LEA shall provide such other reasonable support for its parental involvement activities as the parents may request.
